Recognizes Meyer Weintraub as 2014 Recipient for his Outstanding Commitment to

Mr. Weintraub will assist him for half of the day

then drive back to school and assist other students in learning important life skills. In many ways, he's more of a life coach than a teacher or aide. He's really remarkable."

Weintraub is a retired Philadelphia teacher and his wife is currently a teacher in the Philadelphia area.
